



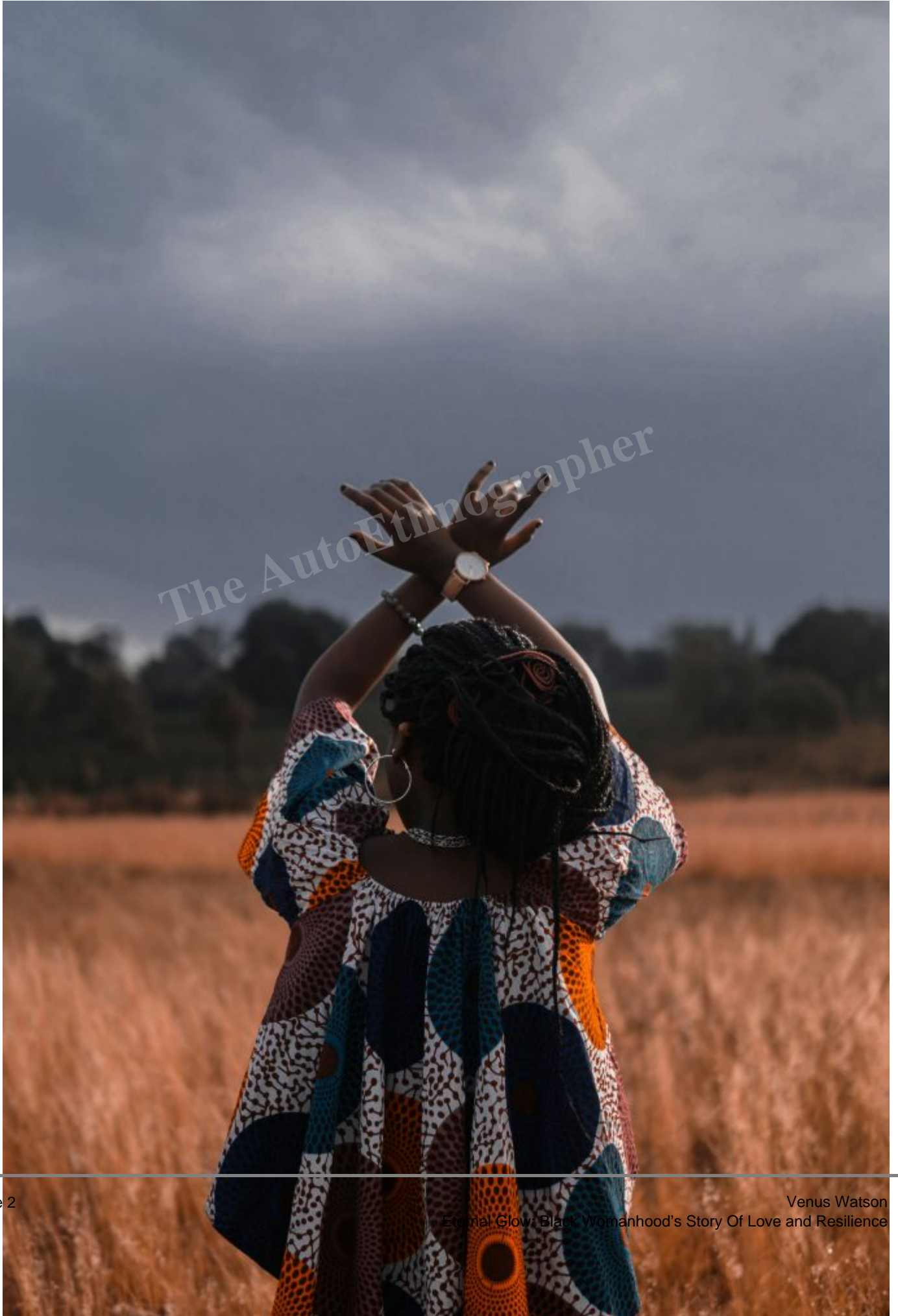

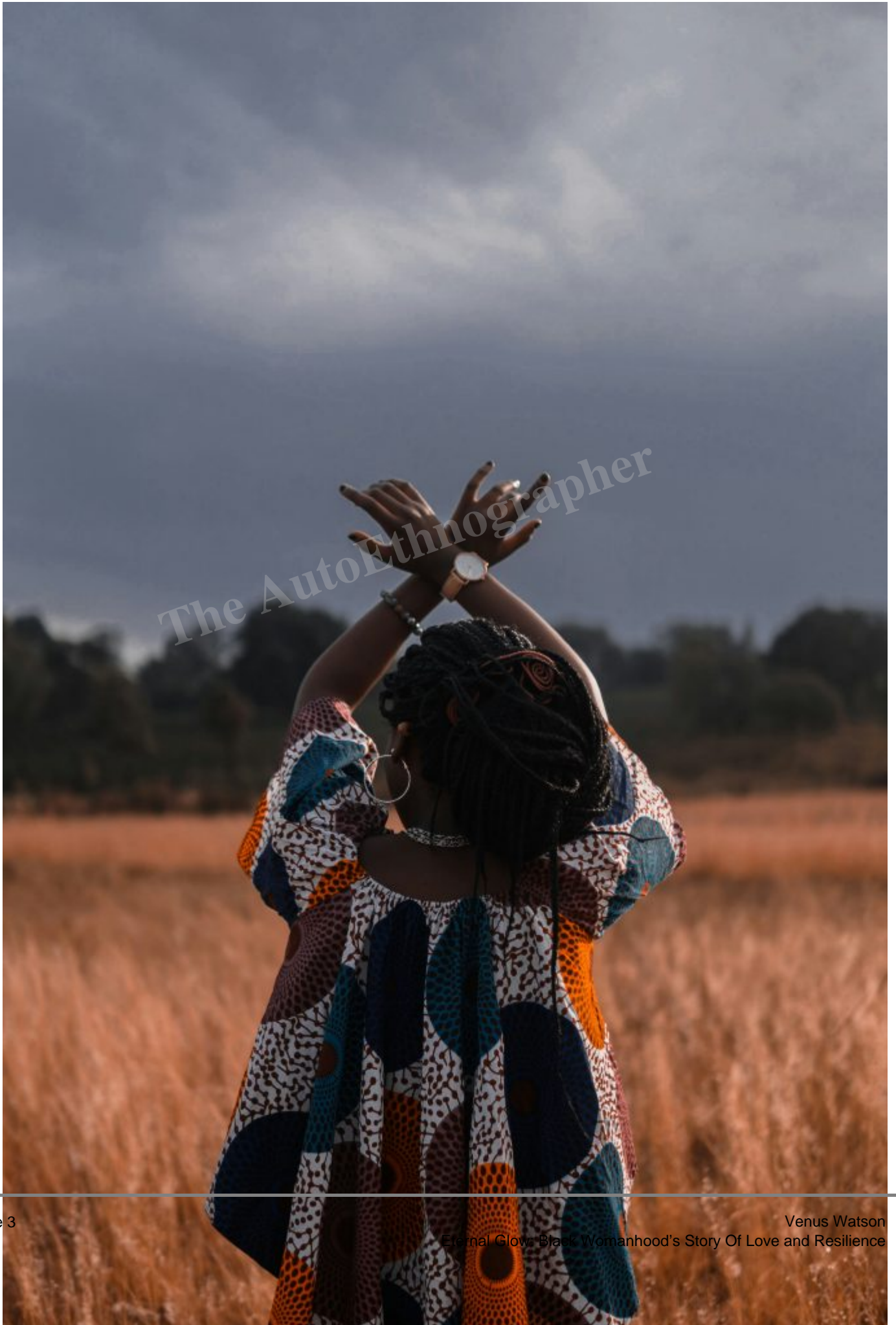
Description
